### Welcome COA Student,

Welcome to the Coming of Age Program for 8<sup>th</sup> graders. This program is intended to be a very special passage in your spiritual education and in your life. Each of you will have the opportunity to develop a sense of self as part of Columbine Spiritual Center within the context of our larger world. Coming of Age is a unique passage - be present for it, have fun and experience a wonderful year!

### Purpose of this Coming of Age Program:

- To provide resources and tools for adulthood, including continuing education in the principles and sources of Unity;
- To provide a grounding in spiritual, social and environmental (service) principles;
- To provide experience of the personal and evolving nature of one's Credo, a set of beliefs that guide you;
- To provide a meaningful discussion about ethics and responsibility;
- To facilitate a sense of connection with caring adults, peers, the Unity community, society at large and the natural world; and
- To celebrate the transition from childhood as a major milestone with a public rite of passage.

### Goals:

- To know oneself as a whole being;
- To know oneself as part of a greater universe; and
- To be recognized by the community.

### Introduction

The syllabus you are holding is a guidebook and a journal that will help you navigate throughout the year. It includes activities and events and outlines Students' and Mentors' responsibilities. Look through it to make sure you understand the program and requirements, and **return the enclosed statements of commitment.** You may want to record scheduled events on the family calendar. Keep the syllabus in a safe place; you will need to refer to it throughout the year. Your Mentor will also receive a copy.

# Program Overview

Coming of Age Students will participate in the traditional Uniteen program in the following ways:

- Take part in the Uniteens classrooms throughout the year;
- Attend planned Uniteen & Youth events, such as team building, social events, and fund-raising;
- Be a greeter on scheduled Uniteen Sundays throughout the year, performing service in the community while fulfilling a COA requirement; and
- Dedicate one Sunday of each month (the 3<sup>rd</sup> Sunday, but subject to change) as a special COA day of learning, exploration, activities and visits to other places of worship.

In addition, COA Students will have:

- Discussions on different spiritual beliefs, metaphysical interpretation, peer relationships and ethics, and finally, balanced lifestyle (body, mind and spirit); and
- Activities outside of class. These will include social service projects, getting to know the Columbine
  community, and exploring your own personal beliefs and spirituality in order to create your own
  individual Credo. Many choices are available from which you can set up your individual program (see
  Activities for Coming of Age)

## History

This is Columbine Spiritual Center's seventh Coming of Age program. Our staff and volunteers have studied programs used by other organizations before deciding on this particular one. We are grateful to a number of Unity churches and the First Unitarian Society of Newton for their input as we created this program. This is a work in progress, inviting the participants' individual energies to make it their own.

Our purpose is to provide our 8<sup>th</sup> grade Students with a spiritual context within which to express and celebrate their growth toward adulthood.

The program will culminate in a Coming of Age graduation in the Sanctuary in May of 2015. During the ceremony, each Student will present a personal statement of spiritual beliefs, a Credo. Our minister, youth director, Uniteen sponsors, graduates' families, friends, Mentors, and the congregation will participate in the ceremony honoring the graduates.

We realize that Students are busy people. The demands of school, sports, music and other activities can be daunting. We therefore have designed this program to be more fun and flexible and experiential, and less academic. Your feedback is always welcome. We ask for your commitment to fully participate and complete the Coming of Age Program.

### Mentors' Responsibilities

In our COA program each Student is paired with an adult Mentor, someone active in our church. The Mentors and Students meet throughout the program to share experiences, adventures, feelings, thoughts and ideas, and sometimes to work on completing program requirements. We ask each Mentor to do the following:

- 1. Join her/his Student in an open and supportive relationship in which good fellowship, enjoyment and fun are central. Plan to spend at least four hours per month with your Student, which can include the scheduled large-group activities. Also, be aware that doing things with one or more other pairs of Mentors/Students can be really fun.
- 2. Oversee the Student's progress in the program, and support the Student in finding answers to any questions he/she may have about the program.
- 3. Start an ongoing dialogue with your Student regarding our Unity faith and their beliefs, and facilitate the development of a Credo.
- 4. Support the Student in overcoming barriers such as transportation problems, time conflicts, and fears and concerns about fulfilling any of the requirements of the Coming of Age program.
- 5. Participate in the Coming of Age graduation ceremony in May 2015.
- **6.** Communicate with the Program Coordinator about questions and/or concerns regarding any aspects of the program.

### Student's Responsibilities

- Attend Uniteen classes and visits to other worship services regularly;
- Maintain a relationship with your Mentor. You are expected to meet with your Mentor at least four hours per month. Some of this time will be experiences with other Mentors and 8<sup>th</sup> grade Students, such as social activities. Other times will be the two of you doing something together or progressing through the experiences found in the Activities manual;
- Each Student and Mentor will design an individualized program taken from the accompanying activities
  manual. Three categories in the manual to choose from are: Spiritual Journeys and Exploring Unity;
  Service Within and Beyond Unity; Relationships. Some activities are required as indicated on the
  Activities lists;
- Regularly check in with the Program Director concerning your progress through the COA program. Checkins will be done intermittently, but you should plan the following:

January	Completion of 3 activities
February	Completion of 5 activities
March	Completion of 7 activities
April	Completion of 9 activities
May	Completion of 10 activities

- Attend team building days;
- Attend scheduled COA activities and those with Mentor;
- Serve as a greeter with the Uniteens at Columbine during the year;
- Regularly discuss your evolving beliefs with your Mentor so that you will be prepared to write your Credo (during the spring);
- Attend Credo writing workshops in March/April/May (dates to be announced);
- Prepare a Credo of your personal spiritual beliefs;
- Participate in the creation of a graduation ceremony that pays respect to all the work you have accomplished this year; and
- Support other Students on this journey you are all taking. Use the power of your imagination, and develop more clarity about your values, purpose, and direction.

Enjoy yourself and have a wonderful year!

### Parent Involvement

### Parents, please:

- 1. Be aware of what is happening in the program. *Any scheduling changes will be e-mailed*. Help your child with transportation if necessary, support the attendance requirement and help the Mentor make connections if needed;
- 2. Let your child's Mentor know of any concerns or ideas you have while supporting the development of your child and Mentor's independent relationship;
- 3. Attend parent meetings;
- 4. Volunteer to help with some activity, e.g. drive members of the group to or from a scheduled location;
- 5. Communicate with the Program Coordinator, Uniteen sponsors or parent liaison about any concerns you have during the year;
- 6. Volunteer some time for the preparation and organization of graduation celebrations;
- 7. Provide food/drinks for special occasions; and
- 8. Sign and return permission/release forms (see attached).

This program is a living creature - it changes every year - more like an ongoing conversation between and among our Youth and Columbine Spiritual Center.

Our hope is that it continues to get richer and deeper.
